

June Meeting Topic: Annual Potluck



Birdwatcher: The Life of Roger Tory Peterson

This biography of the great ornithologist, Roger Tory Peterson, by Elizabeth Rosenthal is full of wonderful stories that provide a complete picture of this complex man. Rosenthal examines Peterson's life and accomplishments from his impact on field guides

to his role in land conservation and habitat restoration campaigns. Numerous direct quotes give the reader a clearer sense of Peterson's passion for



birding and the natural world. I suggest this very pleasant book on one of birding's greatest heroes for your summer reading list.

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Comments From the President

One of my favorite birding roads is Stony Point Pass, which connects routes 20 and 231, in Northeast Albemarle County. This gravel road passes through some reasonably good bird habitat. The best portion of the road is at about its halfway point, where there is a metal gate on the south side. Sometimes there are birds in the vegetation around the gate, and some times you have to walk up a slope through a fairly recently logged over area in order to find them.

I had occasion to go birding at this spot the morning of May 9 with Jenny Gaden. The first bird of interest there was a Baltimore Oriole. After hearing the oriole's chatter, we found it, followed it and by doing so discovered its nest, already completed. Presently we heard the chucky -tuck call of a Summer Tanager, and found both a male and female. As best I can tell, this tanager nests on this slope, as I have seen it there in previous years. While I watched a Chestnut-sided Warbler, Jenny found the bird of the morning, a handsome Bay-breasted Warbler. Moving with it was an equally good-looking Blackpoll Warbler. Off in the distance a Hooded Warbler, which also nests on this slope, delivered its pert song. A little further down the road we heard the upward spiral of a Swainson's Thrush.

From Stony Point Pass, we re-crossed the mountain on Turkey Sag Road. Along that road, we heard the rich song of a Kentucky Warbler, tracked it down and had a fine look at a songster often hard to see. We eventually made our way over to Chris Greene Lake and had nice looks at another migrant, a Caspian Tern, on its way from and to who knows where. This is quite an uncommon species in the county. We ended our morning of birding with over eighty species, not working all that hard for them. That is the way it can be on a morning in May in these parts. I hope all of you have gotten out for some May birding and had success. Activity will all too soon slow down.

Jenny and I were out as participants in the Albemarle County spring count. (Continued on page 2)

This is a bird count done for a number of years by a group of twenty-five or so "friends." The count, begun around 1975, has been co-ordinated most recently by Jim Childress. Jim would like the count to have wider participation. I would like to see it made a truly county-wide effort. At the moment, huge areas of the County go uncovered. An effort is being made to map all areas presently covered. Once that is done, we can see exactly which areas needs coverage. I am hopeful Monticello Bird Club members will set aside the first Saturday of May in 2010 in order to participate. In most cases, a half-day only is necessary. I will be reporting on this from time to time. Many counties around the United States have spring bird counts. We should be among them.

Ron and Priscilla Kingston tell me that our June potluck will be June 11 at 6:00 PM at Ivy Creek. Bring a dish to share and your own utensils, plates and cups. The bird club will provide

beverages. Afterward, weather permitting, we'll have a bird walk.
