Comments From the President

Nuggets sometimes take a while to surface. I recently got around to reading an article from a 2008 magazine, proof that things happen slowly over here in Belmont. Entitled The Loneliness of the Chinese Birdwatcher, it dealt with the devotion of the tiny few in China who are trying against all odds to make room for their feathered brethren as their country continues to industrialize at a dizzying pace. The author's observations on the scarcity of birdlife there certainly tallied with our own experience some twenty years ago when we were forever commenting on how few birds we were seeing. As I have often thought that the experience of the U.S. a century ago provides a good parallel to the rapid growth now transforming that young/old giant, it gives me hope that some Chinese Theodore Roosevelts and Neltje Blanchans are out there getting revved up for the big fights ahead. The easiest thing in the world it seems to me is to simply give up because so much in the news is just so terribly discouraging, and indeed it is often hard to keep insisting to oneself that the glass that looks half-empty is really half-full. Nevertheless, the news that there are birders in China can only be good news for anyone who cares about the health of the planet. Birding by itself is hardly a guarantee that environmental decay will stop but—and author's bias here—any country where twitcher numbers are growing is on the right track. May they thrive.

Please join any or all of these adventures to see what birds are nesting at Ivy Creek this summer.



Peanut Butter Bird Food

Ingredients:

One Pound of Lard
One 18 ounce jar of peanut butter
One two pound package of corn meal
Three cups of whole wheat flour

Melt lard and peanut butter in a large sauce pan over low - medium heat. When melted add corn meal and flour, stirring until mixed. Pour mixture into a 2 quart milk/juice carton and refrigerate until firm.

Cut into 6 equal blocks and wrap with plastic wrap.

Keep cool or frozen until ready for use.
