March is the month of expectation, The things we do not know, Persons of Prognostication Are coming now.

This is the way Emily Dickinson begins one of her poems. March is the month when we turn away from winter and embrace the approach of spring. While we never know quite what to expect from the weather – one day balmy, the next bitter – March has ancient promises to keep and we can expect her to fulfill them. So here I come – a Person of Prognostication. Let me prophesize what is in store in the next few weeks.

The weather will be changeable. The earth will keep its appointed rounds and sail to a place where day and night are equal. The Pine Warbler

will give its buzzy trill and treat us to flashes of yellow high in the pines. Peepers will call to one another with silvery sounds from wet places. In the woods the tiny Spring Azure and the dark brown Mourning Cloak will be the first butterflies in flight. Hepatica, the small blue wildflower that hugs the ground, will be in bud and, in places, in bloom. Before the end of the month I expect to hear the bubbly song of the Louisiana Waterthrush when he returns to the stream behind my house. Goldfinches will be show a brighter yellow than in February and some Redshouldered Hawks will be hunkered down on the nest. The male woodcock will spiral into the early evening sky and zigzag down to earth where a lady awaits in judgment. "Peent," he'll say. In these things March will not disappoint us.

Recent Bird Sightings: Carol Hill reported on an immature male Redtailed Hawk who sits on a bird house hunting for mice in the culverts. She has had a flock of Purple Finches at her feeder all winter but has not seen the Red-bellied Woodpecker. Stauffer Miller announced that there is an exhibit of bird paintings currently on display at the Mud House Coffee House. 

Register now for this year's annual Virginia Society of Ornithology meeting, held in conjunction with the Mountain Lake Migratory Bird Festival in Giles County, Virginia at the Mountain Lake Hotel. This weekend promises to be an exciting experience.

The keynote speaker will be Ian Sinclair, who will provide a view from the Eastern Hemisphere with his presentation "The Lighter Side of Birding Darkest Africa". Also, Bill Hilton, Jr. will provide a view from the Western Hemisphere with a review of his continuing work banding Ruby-throated Hummingbirds on both their breeding grounds in the United States and on their wintering grounds in Costa Rica.

There will be a rich variety of field trips and workshops to attend. All will be lead by birders or naturalists that are knowledgeable about their subject and enthusiastic about sharing their knowledge. Also scheduled are guided rafting trips on the historic New River offering unique bird sightings. In addition to the many hikes and workshops around the Mountain Lake Hotel and Jefferson National Forest, there will be activities for children in the conservancy at Mountain Lake.
